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### **Boone County Fair Campgrounds Rules**

The following are a list of rules and guidelines for the camping area at the Boone County Fairgrounds:

- All campers must be chaperoned by an adult. Children 18 or under are **NOT** allowed to camp by themselves.
- Horses or any other livestock are not allowed in the campgrounds
- One vehicle per lot space will be permitted in camping area; additional vehicles must be parked in the parking lots.
- Campers must pull in on their designated time/day, unless other arrangements have been made with the office
- Any issues with utilities at your campsite should be reported to a fair board member to be repaired.
- If you did not pay for a full hookup, you should not stay hooked up to the hydrant.
- Water and sanitary dumps are available at designated areas for camper usage.
- All streets, alleys and drives in around and thru the campgrounds must be open to traffic at all times.
- Speed Limit in the Camping area is **5 MPH**. Unauthorized ATV's, golf carts, etc. are not permitted on the Fairground property.
- Biking is not allowed in the campgrounds after dark.
- Campfires are only permitted in designated fire rings on gravel pads.
- Pets are permitted in the campgrounds provided they are on a leash or if they are used for handicap purposes.
- Bathroom & shower houses are available for use 24/7 during the fair (with the exception of when they are being cleaned). Please clean up after yourself and be courteous to other campers using the facilities.
- Fair Campers have first right of refusal for their campsite the following year.

### **IN CASE OF STORM OR TORNADO**

#### **EMERGENCY SHELTER PROCEDURE**

**Purpose:** To establish a safe, efficient procedure to move fair attendees, participants, staff and fair board members from exposed fairgrounds activities areas offering more protection in the event of a major catastrophe (i.e. storm, accident, etc.)

It is recognized that the Fairgrounds do not contain enough on-site shelters to house all attendees during a tornado. Therefore, every effort shall be made to move attendees to safer areas.

#### **Procedure:**

- A. The Fair Board President or Secretary shall either be informed by emergency management or determine themselves that an imminent emergency condition exists that requires attendees to take immediate shelter.
  - a. The nature of the emergency shall determine whether a general evacuation order shall be made or if specific directions shall be relayed to the public (i.e., impending rain storm or tornado).
  - b. In the event specific directions are required, information with regards to shelter locations and/or strategies.
  - c. Potential storm shelters include: Fair Buildings and personal vehicles.
  - d. Potential tornado shelters include: Community building, shower houses, or drainage ditches surrounding fair grounds.
- B. The Fair Board President or Secretary shall utilize all available public address systems to inform fair attendees of the need to take shelter.
- C. Unless decision to inform attendees to take immediate shelter is made by emergency management or law enforcement, Fair Board Office shall call 911 to inform them of the decision to evacuate
- D. Fair Board members shall assist in directing attendees to the appropriate shelter locations.
- E. First priority shall be the preservation of human life. Only if opportunity safely exists shall livestock be released.
- F. Following the emergency requiring attendees to take shelter, Fair Board members shall be informed by the Board president or Secretary that attendees can leave their shelter locations.
- G. Following the emergency, the Board president or Secretary shall make the determination as to whether to close the Fair and evacuate the fairgrounds or to resume Fair activities.
